So, fellow Songbirds, new restrictions and a rising number of cases of Covid-19 form the backdrop to this latest Newsletter! Concerns expressed by the committee in the August Newsletter about the possible health risks involved in reopening our choir have become far too real in recent weeks and for now we can only remain 'waiting in the wings' for safer times while Covid-19 cases continue to increase in number, and growing swathes of the UK experience tighter restrictions.

As you will know, our choir is a member of the National Association of Choirs and the Midland East Group held a Zoom Open Forum on October 3rd which Charlotta was able to 'attend' on our behalf. The purpose of the forum was to look at the current restrictions answer questions from members about the situation for choirs like ours. There will be notes produced from the meeting which we hope to share with you in the next Newsletter. It seems that there are a number of choirs using Zoom and WhatsApp for 'rehearsals' and there may be ways in which we can benefit from others' experience to develop our own practice further during Covid-19 restrictions.

As a result of the financial situation reported in the August Newsletter many members have made voluntary contributions of £30 and the Committee would like to thank them all for helping to ensure that the choir can remain financially stable and continue to meet its financial obligations during this time. Although the venue has been able to reopen to one or two small groups, it is not yet available to larger groups.

Mini Berry Cakes - A recipe from Julia

Ingredients:

- 150g porridge oats
- 150ml milk
- 2 ripe bananas
- 2 handfuls of raspberries and 2 handfuls blueberries
- 2 tbsp smooth peanut butter

Directions

- 1. Put the oats into a mixing bowl and pour over the milk.
- 2. In a separate dish, mush up the 2 ripe bananas and mix in the peanut butter.
- 3. Add this mixture to the mixing bowl containing the oats and milk.
- 4. Mush up the raspberries and gently stir into the oat mixture.
- 5. Finally add the blueberries into the oat mixture either whole or halved.
- 6. Spoon the mixture into 8 cupcake cases or pour onto a flat baking tray to slice when cool.
- 7. Cook at 180 degrees/Gas Mark 4 for 15 minutes.
- 8. Enjoy!!

Book Reviews - From Martine

"The Other Side of Augusta Hope" by Joanna Glen

Even as a child Augusta never felt she fitted in and her only friend is her twin sister. She picks her favourite country from the sound of its name - Burundi - and as an adult, dreams of exotic places until a tragedy

upends everything in her life. A well written and moving story, told in dual narratives against the background of the 1990's genocides.

"Girl, Woman, Other" by Bernadine Evaristo

This book was joint winner of the Man Booker Prize 2019. It follows the interwoven lives of 12 very different characters, mostly women, black and British. While the lack of punctuation is unconventional, I felt that this created a lyrical style which enhanced the thought processes of the characters. An excellent read.

"The Offing" by Benjamin Myers

At the end of WWII a 16 year old boy walks from Durham to Robin Hood's Bay and meets an eccentric older woman. This is the tender story of the friendship that develops between them, based on their shared love of poetry.

"Lady in Waiting - My Extraordinary Life in the Shadow of the Crown" by Anne Glenconner Lady Glenconner's memoir of her remarkable life, part of it as Lady in Waiting to Princess Margaret. This is a fascinating insight into 'how the other half live', full of wit, tragedy and drama.
